Flag Day

Flag Day is celebrated on June 14th in the United States to honor the country's national flag. On this day in 1777, the Continental Congress officially decided the Stars and Stripes would be America's flag, but it took until 1949 for Flag Day to finally become an official holiday, which was approved by Congress and signed into law by President Harry Truman. In 1958, a 17-year old student, Robert Heft, designed the 50-star American flag for a school project and President Dwight Eisenhower chose his design out of about 1,500 other submissions. Over the years, there have been 27 different versions of the U.S. flag, each version with a different number of stars to represent each new state being added. The 13 red and white stripes represent the original 13 colonies. Today, Flag Day is celebrated by many individuals and communities flying the Stars and Stripes!



Hazelnut Brownies By: MIA ISABELLA SAN INOCENCIO D' ARIA ALIO

Ingredients

- One box of 16 hazelnut chocolate wafer balls
- 250g pack salted butter, plus extra for greasing
- 250g golden caster sugar
- 225g light muscovado sugar
- 100g cocoa powder
- 4 large eggs
- 100g self-raising flour
- 85g ready-chopped hazelnuts
- 4 tbsp hazelnut liqueur

Method

STEP 1

- Unwrap the chocolates, place on a tray and pop in the freezer. Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Lightly grease and line the base and sides of a 21-22cm square tin with baking parchment.
- Put the butter, sugars and cocca into your largest saucepan and gently melt together, stirring regularly so the mixture doesn't catch. Once the sugar granules have just about disappeared, take off the heat, tip into a bowl and leave to cool for 5 mins.

 STEP 3

Use a whisk or wooden spoon to beat the eggs, one by one, into the mixture. When they're completely incorporated and the mixture is smooth and shiny, stir in the flour, hazelnuts and liqueur. Tip the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for 35 mins.

STEP 4

Remove the tin from the oven and use a cutlery knife to mark the top of the brownies into 16 squares (don't cut through, it's just as a guide). Use a teaspoon to push a little dent in the center of each portion and add a frozen hazelnut wafer chocolate into each dip. Return to the oven for 3 mins, then remove and leave to cool completely.

STEP 5
Once cool, cut into 16 squares. Will keep for 3 days in an airtight container.
